Private text as proof? May hit privacy wall

HC Cites SC Ruling After Qureshi Plea

New Delhi: Citing the recent Supreme Court ruling on privacy, the Delhi high court has questioned if private messages can be relied upon as evidence in a criminal inves-

In a recent hearing, a bench of justices Siddharth Mridul and Najmi Waziri asked if messages sent on BlackBerry Messenger (BBM) can be treated as evidence following the SC ruling declaring privacy as a fundamental right.

The HC said the government and the Enforcement Directorate will have to address this point while hearing a plea by meat exporter and businessman Moin Qureshi challenging his recent arrest by ED in a money laundering case. He has filed a writ arguing that the investigating agency arrested him without citing grounds of arrest, violating the Constitution.

"What kind of reverse investigation is this? No grounds of arrest have been furnished," Qureshi's lawyer R K Handoo argued, asking why his client was being targeted. During the hearing, the

As per ED, Qureshi was arrested on the basis of BBM messages exchanged between him, former CBI chief AP Singh and several persons accused in other criminal cases.

The court listed the matter for September 13, pointing out that "in view of the submissions of the counsel for the petitioner that he has not been informed of grounds of his detention in terms of constitutional imperative under Article 22, it is necessary to issue notice," the bench

The bench reiterated the settled law that a person cannot be taken into custody without telling him/her the grounds and giving him/her effective legal aid.

"Information is not just to make a person read the grounds of arrest. You have to give him a copy of it. You cannot deny liberty to someone without grounds. We are afraid that this may take us to the dark ages. It is negating the constitutional mandate," the bench observed, asking ED to "show us the files" as "courts have to uphold constitutional mandate. There are rights which you cannot take away. That is why we want you to go through the privacy judgment of SC.

The records collected by ED from the income tax department in the form of BBM messages allegedly "revealed that Qureshi has taken huge amount of money from different persons for obtaining undue favours from public servants after exercising his personal influence".

FACTORS AT PLAY

A number of external and internal factors, such as, increased pollution levels, excessive crowding leading to claustrophobia, smog, burn hazards etc as well as change in living habits, such as binge eating, uncontrolled drinking, affinity for fast food, lack of sleep etc, play havoc with the overall well-being of a person. THE HEALTHY WAY

Medical practitioners and experts share a word of caution for the ensuing festive season. First, this is a period when the rainy season is towards its end and a number of viral infections, such as influenza, are in vogue as they spread fast in a crowd. Second, gastro intestinal diseases too create havoc depending on the type of food taken, personal hygiene etc and this propagates throughout communities. Lack of proper sleep or rest affects the immunity too.

A DIFFERENT IMPLICATION

There's also a socio-economic side to medical issues during this period, feels Dr Partha Pratim Sen, consultgeneral surgery. Superspeciality Hospital, Howrah. "People residing in the periphery often come over to treat complicated surgical cases during this period as against planned surgeries. This is because many doctors are on leave and other issues, like a drop in blood donation, make things difficult for them. However, road blocks and traffic diversions, bank holidays and non-availability of blood often pose serious issues," feels Dr Sen.

FITNESS FIRST

"It is the time to look good and stay in shape as the festive period approaches. Not just the regulars, first timers too often hit the gym to be back in shape. Some may take to other forms of exercise such as cycling, running marathons or doing yoga. Basically, it is a time when there needs to be positive energy with physical activity." feels Gagan Sachdev. Others should consult a nutritionist and follow their advise," he adds.

During the festivals, with long hours of walking, late nights and pandal hopping, sleep patterns need to be regulated. "High intensity workouts are not the need of the hour; a brisk walk or jog of 10 to 15 minutes with five to 10 minutes of yoga or crunches can do the trick," advises Irfan Javed, director of Burunout Fitness Studio.

The exercise regime and momentum should be maintained round the year, feels Mamata Kapoor, director, GK Sportsline. "Sporting the right apparel and footwear for a particular kind of physical activity is very essential and must be adhered to," she adds.

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HAIR AND SKIN STORY

Not just the body but skin and hair too need pampering pre and post festive season. Says Dipan Pal, hair and skin expert of Mèlange, "A good hair cut is a must. Split ends must be taken care of as this gives a very dry look. Some amount of styling, like curling or straightening, can also work

wonders as will soft colours." Post-festivals, some common home remedies are much needed, he feels. "A lukewarm mixture of olive, coconut and almond oil should be used on the hair and scalp followed by a hot towel regime for 15. to 20 minutes, twice a week. Coconut oil can be used to take off any makeup followed by a face wash and moisturiser. The dull, dark
